Use fall and winter to prepare for spring gardening! Ladd Smith will teach fall gardening practices that will help your garden recover from the summer heat and stress. These methods will also minimize spring gardening labor, such as creating healthy soil, planting to take advantage of the fall and winter rains, directing stormwater in the winter for garden use, and getting rid of pests using non-pesticide options.
